From Pastor Joel Skindlov

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ.

Where have you seen God's abundance recently? Where have you seen or been a part of offering a sign of God's provision in your life? In the life of Prince of Peace? March marks the beginning of Spring, as sunlight stays around longer, the ground warms, and peculiar plants pop through the hard ground. As we move through the season of Lent, the stories of God's people, our stories speak of both the pain and struggle of life and also God's goodness and provision. Jesus talks quite a lot about food, plants, harvest, loaves and fishes, throughout all of the Gospels. In Mark 4, Jesus shares the parable of Sower, the parable of the seeds, and continues with stories of feeding people in Mark chapter 6 and 8.

In Mark 4, Jesus had recently sent the disciples out, two by two, into the villages and countryside. Once they returned from this mission venture, Jesus calls the disciples to go with him to a deserted place. The quiet and calm did not last too long.

"They went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As they went ashore, Jesus saw a great crowd; and he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many thing" (Mark 6:32-34, NRSV). As the gospel story continues, the disciples finally approach Jesus and tell him about their current situation. It's late, everyone is hungry and we are about thirty minutes from the nearest restaurant! Frustrated and exhausted, the disciples seem to point to a very logical and reasonable response, "send them away, so that they may go into the surrounding country and villages and buy something for themselves to eat" (Mark 6:36, NRSV).

Jesus has other plans. "But he answered them, 'You give them something to eat' (Mark 6:37, NRSV). In the midst of the wilderness, late at night, Jesus challenges the disciples and invites the disciples to participate in this kingdom of God, the activity of God, in one of the last places we might think possible. This conversation goes back and forth, as the disciples ask questions, How? Where? What are we doing?

And Jesus responds with a question, "Have many loaves have you? Go and see" (Mark 6:38, NRSV). What a beautiful and challenging response! I appreciate that Jesus allows the disciples, allows us to ask the questions, consider the circumstances and then invite us to wonder and respond.

Jesus feeds people and invites us to do the same, to follow and respond. About a month ago, we had a Souper Bowl challenge that helped raise nearly \$200 towards the purchase of items for Prince of Peace little pantry. We partner with Caritas, a local food pantry in Northwest Spokane, that provides food and other necessities to people in need. The food box has clients stop by our church to help feed their families or themselves in a vital way.

During our midweek Lenten Soup suppers and Worship at Prince of Peace, we continue that ministry of helping feed people.

"We will continue "Soup Supper with a Twist"-come enjoy soup supper on Wednesdays and bring a can of soup for our little pantry. If you can't make midweek service, please donate a can on Sunday!" (from Reminders for the Week).

Jesus challenges and invites us into this ministry as we participate in the activity of Christ in our neighborhoods and communities. This local partnership with Caritas reveals Jesus' presence through us!

Prince of Peace also supports ELCA World Hunger, which recently celebrated its 50th Anniversary in early February. A group of three leaders from around our synod attended the three-day event for a time of learning, networking, and planning for shared ministry to reduce food insecurity locally and globally. This group brought back information and action steps to help support local and global ministries that work to reduce hunger and food insecurity.

Christ sustain, strengthen and nourish us, as we respond feeding, caring, and serving our neighbor and one another in Jesus' name.

Speaking of our gifts - God tells us that we are <u>ALL</u> blessed with gifts, talents and passions. What are yours?


As we pray every Sunday:

SPRING CLEANUP 2024 (Mark your calendar: March 16th)

Yes it's about that time again. It's time to spruce up around POP and get ready for Easter. Actually after taking a walk around the grounds things don't look bad, thanks to those of you who have taken charge of a certain area and maintained it through out last year. There's a signup list on the bulletin board for those of you that would like to commit to the same or different area this year.

The plan is to make Saturday March 16th our cleanup day, weather permitting. If weather won't allow then we'll attempt the workday for the following Saturday (Sat. before Palm Sunday). 9:00 am has seemed to work good for most that are willing to help in the past. If we get a good turn out should be done by noon.

It probably would be a good idea to bring a shovel, lawn or garden rake, hedge clippers (gas powered if you have them), hand shears, broom, kneeler, snow shovel makes a great dust pan. Good idea to put your name on them. There always seems to be something left behind. A few large plastic lawn garbage bags would be helpful.

The following are areas that need attention.

- 1. Trim and shape the hedge along Indian Trail
- 2. Parking lot islands. (clean & trim shrubs and bushes, rake up leaves)
- 3. Rake up acorns beneath Oak tree next to AC units
- 4. Pick up trash and debris in the Natural Area
- 5. Pull weeds and general maintenance of Pacific Park sign
- 6. Shrub beds near 3 crosses and in front of church look pretty good (areas that someone has taken ownership and kept them looking good all year)
- 7. Parking lot curbing will have to be attended to later in the spring. It would be great if someone would step forward to keep the grasses and weeds under control throughout the rest of the year.


Why forgiveness? What makes forgiveness so difficult? How might forgiveness offer life and healing?


